Major thanks must go to John Fitzgerald who has been a part of the Board since its establishment in 2002 when the NRAA was incorporated as a Company. He has been heavily involved, especially with Competitions and Rules during that long period of service.

Bob Pedersen undertook the folios for Rules and then IT over a number of years and was instrumental in promoting F Class.

Reg Cunningham was the person in charge of Rules with his stint as a Director. He was plagued early in his tenure with questions concerning the application of the rules.

Within 12 months the balance of the "old men" will finish their terms of appointment. Good quality applicants for these two positions will be sought.

There is a perception amongst shooting members that the Directors are on a gravy train. The reality is that the directors meet much of the cost of their office from their own resources. They receive little financial support other than fares and accommodation at meetings.

A meeting will be held electronically on December 18 and a Board Meeting in early March. This delay has been the result of the requirements of people to be at the Palma matches in New Zealand in January and February.

Unfortunately, there has been disquiet from the F Class community over the selection of team Captain. Both nominees were seen as worthy of the position but only one was chosen. There will be further discussions on the matter but you only have to look at the various Parliaments to realise what division can be instigated. Shooters can decide not to continue with their application for the matches in South Africa. It will enable another aspiring team member to have the opportunity to be included in the eventual team.

Best wishes to the various teams - Australian Rifle Team, Veterans, Under 25 and Under 21 who will be competing in what can be described as the Palma Matches.

May you continue to enjoy the sport of Target Rifle Shooting overall and when given the chance to do so, speak of its benefits.

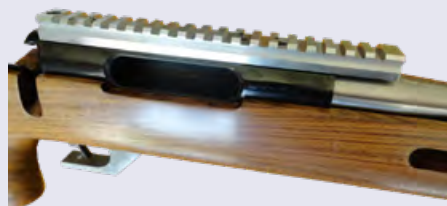

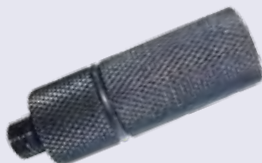

Dear Editor,

As more and more clubs move into the 21st Century with electronic targets it is time that the shooting movement started to give serious consideration as to how we can apply Baffling to our ranges so we can do away with the large areas of unusable land making up our danger zones.

The requirement of danger zones mean that it is becoming almost impossible to either find an area large enough to accommodate what we currently require for a range within easy reach of our membership, as well as hold onto what we already have - or for clubs to be able to afford the cost of purchasing or leasing the required acreage and then building the infrastructure.

There must be some engineers, scientists, computer experts and architects amongst our membership that could come up with practical suggestions on how we could successfully baffle our ranges?

If baffling is possible, look at the benefits it could bring to long range target rifle shooting when married with electronic targets.

We could have fixed firing points under cover. With a fixed firing point the electronic targets could be towed out to whatever distance you are shooting on the day, or you could set up your targets at different distances especially for prize shoots.

You don't need deep and extensive target pits to protect markers, just a small mound at each distance to protect the target electronics at almost a minor cost.

The amount of land required for most clubs would be reduced down to say a strip 200 metres by 1,000 metres, which makes a site for a range much easier to locate and purchase/lease.

With a covered fixed firing point and the use of modern noise absorbing materials, one of the objections that usually arise, that of noise, could be overcome to where it is no longer a problem.

In the case of Anzac Rifle Range, Malabar and Hornsby Rifle Range in Sydney where their danger zones extend into national parks it could be a selling point for the Commonwealth and State Governments to fund the cost of baffling, as locking up parts of national parks for danger zones is always a sticking point in negotiating continued tenancy of the ranges and the freeing up of these areas would be seen as a big win for the Government.

Baffling is being looked at and implemented at overseas ranges so surely it is time that the conversation started here if we wish to see our sport continue to be accepted and thrive.

Australian Match Rifle and Long Range F Class Championships

Early October 2018 saw long-range shooters from across Australia travelling to Coonabarabran NSW to compete in the Australian Match Rifle and Long Range F Class Championships. The 2018 event marked 25 years since the first Australian championships shot on the Woomera Range in South Australia. Shot over three and a half days and 10 ranges, with the last being a 20 shot match at 1200 yards, the Nationals again proved to be a true test of marksmanship.

The range was presented in great condition despite the drought (and kangaroo plague) with the NSW Match Rifle Association and Coonabarabran Rifle Club having spent nearly \$2,000 in recent months reshaping and grooming the long distance mounds in preparation for the Nationals.

Weather conditions throughout the week were good with the only hiccup being a bit of rain on the morning of day three making the 1100 yard mound a bit 'boggy' so the decision was made to shoot that stage back at 1200 yards, resulting in 1 x 1000 yards and 2 x 1200 yard ranges shot on day three.

Match Rifle

Low Horwood got off to a great start in match rifle, taking two of the three ranges on day one and the daily aggregate. Day two however, saw the honours spread between Graham Mincham (1000 yards), Paul Monaghan (1100 yards) and Viv Hunt (1200 yards) with Paul taking the day two aggregate.

Day three saw a new contender - with Tom Smith from Queensland taking both of the 1200 yard wins. However, the best shoot of the MR competition went to a (pretty happy!) Paul Monaghan with a perfect 75.15 at 1000 yards, helping him to the day three aggregate.



Badge Winners

Paul then followed up with a near perfect 99.10 for the 20 shot match at 1200 yards which confirmed his win of the grand aggregate and MR Challenge Cup on 759.70 from Tom Smith on 748.56 and Alan Blain on 746.55.

In MR Reserve, Viv Hunt won five of the 10 ranges on offer as well as two daily aggregates. Viv was the winner of MR Reserve and the Aurora Trophy on 730.63, 14 points ahead of James Freebairn on 716.35.

F Open

There was fierce competition in F Open with six people winning ranges and a different person each day taking the daily honours. Day one saw Adrian Siebel take the first 1000 yard range, with Rob Jeffery taking 1100 and Ernie Mace 1200 yards. But it was Cliff Austen with consistent shooting all day who came through to take the day one aggregate.

Rob Jeffery took 1200 on day two with Ernie Mace taking 1100, John Dixon 1000 and Rob Jeffery the daily

honours. Cliff Austen picked up both the 1200 yards on day three with Adrian Siebel getting his second range win at 1000 yards. Brent Webley then stepped up on day four to take the final 20 shot match at 1200.

The F Open Grand Aggregate and Commonwealth Trophy was won by Rob Jeffery on 864.27 from Ernie Mace on 857.26 and Cliff Austen on 855.21.

FTR

FTR was dominated by a newcomer to long range shooting, with Marty Kelly from Victoria taking five of the ten ranges and the day one, day two and day three aggregates. Steve Smithson from SA took 1100 yards on day one and then team mate Matthew Lagana took 1000 yards on day two.

Marty didn't have it all his own way, however, as some late-comers from SA on day three stirred things, with Michael Hancock taking day three at 1000 yards and Daryl Dolphin taking one of the day three wins at 1200 yards and the final 20 shot 1200 yards.

The FTR Grand Aggregate and the Southern Cross Trophy was won by Marty Kelly on 835.17 by 23 points from Paul Murphy on 812.13 and Matthew Lagana third on 807.17.

The individual competition was then followed by two "friendly" events before the seriousness of the State Team events:

Freebairn Teams for MR consist of four-person self-coaching teams made up from placings in the Nationals such that high ranked and lower ranked shooters are teamed together. This year there were five teams and competition couldn't have been closer with Team Monaghan (Paul Monaghan, Viv Hunt, Mike Samuels and Stephen Clark) pipping Team Blain (Alan Blain, Philip Bain, Chris Halloran and Mark Walters) by only six centres - 288.22 (Team Monaghan) v 288.16 (Team Blain). Third was Team Horwood on 280.17 and fourth and fifth were only one point further back and again only separated on centres - Team Mincham 279.19 and Team Smith on 279.16.

F Class Pairs - For the first time the F Class Pairs was held as a drawn pairs match with one F Open and one FTR shooter drawn for each self-coaching pair; shooting "Bisley Style" (alternately). In the 50 shot match (25 shots per shooter) there were only 11 points separating all five pairs. Marty Kelly and Neville Lyons on 255.5 won by five points from Caleb Hancock and Ernie Mace on 250.3 with Michael Hancock and John Dixon a further point behind on 249.7. In fourth place were Mike Halloran and Adrian Siebel on 246.3 and in fifth position were Russall Lenehan and Rob Jeffery on 244.3.

Undoubtedly, however, the most outstanding performance for the week went to all those who managed to consume more than 80 dozen (80 x 12 = 960) homemade biscuits in less than five days! Truly a remarkable achievement. Thanks to the bakers - Kay, Meryllyn, Margaret, Mike, Shane, Lew and, Susan as well as Ann, Denise and Dawn for their help in the kitchen. Over \$300 was raised from the tea and biscuits which was donated to local Coonabarabran Drought Relief.

Chief Range Officer, John Oddy, was ably assisted by Jenni, Arna and Chris and kept the mound running like clockwork. Target marking was exceptional. In fact, many commented that it was the best they had encountered. The Aldridge twins Ross and Ron, (Ross being the Butts Officer) Joey, Chi, Shane and Coonabarabran local, Bryson, all made an outstanding team.

Special thanks go our Coonabarabran Rifle Club hosts including Mick and Kate Davies and the Acacia Motor Lodge who put on a great meal for the Presentation Dinner.

2018 Match Rifle and F Class State Teams and FTR Team Events

The Match Rifle and Long Range F Class State Teams events followed on from the individual Match Rifle and Long Range F Class championships at Coonabarabran in October and alongside them this year was an inaugural FTR teams event.

Match Rifle State Teams

Five States were represented in the State Match Rifle teams' competition - Victoria, Tasmania, South Australia, New South Wales and Queensland. Match Rifle Teams can be up to six people including the Captain and Coach with four to shoot at each range.

The first competition was the Maloney Match (0 sighters and 16 shots/shooter at 1200 yards) which was won by Queensland with 295.16 with NSW only two points behind in second place on 293.15 and Victoria in third place only three centres behind on 293.12. This was the first time that a Queensland team has won a State Teams event and at the presentation a pretty happy Captain, Viv Hunt, reflected on the work that the team had put into preparing for the event.

The second competition, the Rowlands Trophy (15 shots/shooter at 1000, 1100 and 1200 yards), was won by Victoria on 862.59 with New South Wales again second on 855.73 and Queensland third on 843.55. Victoria took the lead after 1000 yards by four points from Queensland with NSW a further point behind. At 1100 yards, NSW made up five points on Queensland but Victoria went a further five points ahead, taking a nine point lead from NSW into the last range. NSW shot best at 1200 yards making up four points on Victoria but it was not enough, with Victoria taking the Rowlands Trophy for the third time in a row.

The President's Trophy is awarded to the highest scoring coach and shooter in the Rowlands Match and this year the trophy went to Paul Monaghan and Gil Walker from Tasmania with 221.21 by three centres from Peter Maher and Shane Courtney both on 221.18.

The Mincham Team Aggregate was won by Victoria on 1155.71 from New South Wales on 1148.88 and Queensland third on 1138.71. Tasmania finished in fourth place on 1116.88 with South Australia fifth on 1100.61.

F Open State Teams

Three teams competed in the F Open State team competition with Queensland entering what proved to be a strong team combination for their inaugural foray into this competition. New South Wales took a full five person team and a reserve to Coonabarabran with a number of members new to State Team competition. South Australia also provided a strong showing despite some of the members only arriving the day previously, having travelled from competition in Canberra earlier in the week.

The NSW team made a clean sweep of all F Open team events winning the Victoria Match by four points from Queensland, the NSW Match by ten points from Queensland and the South Australian Team Aggregate Trophy on 1004.30 by 14 points from Queensland with South Australia third in all competitions. The NSW team shot a total of 30 "Super X's" - nearly double the number shot by other teams which was a credit to

the high-quality coaching and shooting as well as the great conditions that Coonabarabran dished up for this competition.

The President's Trophy for the highest scoring coach and shooter in the NSW Match went to Peter Broom and Graham Mincham from QLD with 258.12. Two NSW shooters were only separated by one centre for second and third place in the President's Trophy - John Dixon (255.11) and Adrian Siebel (255.10) - both coached by Alan Seaman.

FTR Teams

This was the inaugural FTR Teams competition and was organised to assess the interest in long range FTR team shooting. It was pleasing that three States, Victoria, New South Wales and South Australia all provided teams. Teams could consist of two - four people including Captain and Coach. Composite teams made of members from different States were allowed provided that each State was only represented in one team.

Competition in the first event (0 sighters and 16 shots/shooter at 1200 yards) was extremely close with all three teams only separated by two points. Victoria won the first event on 145.1 from New South Wales second on 144.1 and South Australia third on 143.3.

New South Wales on 462.11 won the second event (The Dyson) which consisted of 15 shots for each shooter at the three ranges of 1000, 1100 and 1200 yards. NSW won this event narrowly by four points from South Australia on 458.11.

New South Wales then also won the FTR Team Aggregate event with 606.12 from South Australia on 601.14 and Victoria on 592.8.

Given the great response to the inaugural FTR Teams' competition, it is hoped that this competition can be further developed to become an approved State Teams event in coming years.

Victorian Match Rifle Championship

Victorian Match Rifle held Round Six of the National Match Rifle and Long Range F Class Championship over the first weekend of November at the Stawell Shooting Complex. The Championship began with the Australian Match Rifle Team having a two day practice for their upcoming overseas competition tour to Great Britain to challenge for the Woomera Trophy. As expected, weather conditions for the first day's practice in November were near perfect, so team shooters got down to it.

With the practice days out of the way, long range shooters from all over Australia descended upon Stawell for the weekend's shooting competition. As always, the field of competitors was strong with thirty shooters competing for badges and awards.

Day One had near perfect conditions in the morning, with Peter Maher from Victoria taking out the first round at 1000 yards in Match Rifle Open with an impressive first possible for the day of 75.9. Tom Smith, Queensland, was chasing and was just short with a 75.8 and Rob Halloran, NSW, was next with a 74.6. Gill Walker, Tasmania, took out first at 1000 yards in Match Rifle Reserve with a 74.4. In the Long Range F Class Championship a field of 12 shooters from both FTR and F Open started strong. In FTR, Mick Punturiero, South Australia, took the first lead of the day with an 87.4 followed by Paul Murphy, Victoria, 85.3 and another South Australian, Steve Smithson and Soa Muljoatmodjo, Victorian, both on 84.1. Ever reliable Cliff Austen, NSW, striking an 82.1 and Mark Pilgrim, Victoria a 77.0 in F Open to complete the first range.

After a quick morning tea, the shooters were back at 1100 yards but as it is with the sport of long range shooting, a strong southerly wind approached that would challenge shooters. Chris Halloran, NSW took stock of the condition with a very acceptable 73.4. Current Australian Captain Paul Monaghan was not far behind with a 72.4 and Jim Kelly, Tasmania was next with 71.5. In Match Rifle Reserve it was Mark Walters ahead, also a Tasmanian with 71.7. In FTR it was

Marty Kelly of Victoria who came back with an 83.3. Mick Punturiero found the conditions trying with 80.4, but again it was Paul Murphy who was challenging the leaders with a 78.3. With lunch over, the final range of the day would be at 1200 yards with a 20 shot match. In Match Rifle and Long Range F Class the first 1200 match of the championship is a 20 shot match. All shooters receive three sighters at this range. Shooters took to the mound and it was Jim Kelly in Match Rifle Open who opened his account with a 96.6, Tom Smith again just a bit unlucky with 94.8 and Paul Monaghan 93.4. Match Rifle Reserve saw Owen Henry gain an impressive 93.6. Mick Punturiero in FTR was in the lead with 105.0 over Marty Kelly 102.2 with the dark horse of the championship Steve Smithson keeping Mick and Marty very honest with 99.0. F Open was led by Cliff Austen again with a score of 107.1 over Mark Pilgrim 90.0.

With day one completed and daily aggregate scores calculated Jim Kelly was the winner in Match Rifle Open with 239.17 and Match Rifle Reserve Mark Walters was in the lead with 233.18. The winner of FTR

Bathurst Rifle Club

The Championships on October 27 and 28 this year threw up a set of conditions not seen for many years, even on a weekly club basis. Instead of the sunny day and gusty winds presented to shooters at the Saturday practice session, Sunday was still and overcast. Just a whisper of breeze from the east to north east quarter masked a treacherous mirage which grew more dangerous as the temperature went past the comfortable stage.

The disappointing attendance of just 40 shooters was cancelled out by the closeness of the competition. At the onset of shooting the overcast conditions kept the temperature down and the total lack of wind presented shooters with a great canvas on which to display their talents - and this, many did.

At the onset, the 500 yard range looked to be an easy cop as the A Grade Target Rifle competitors piled on the possibles. Local Steve Williams took the lead with 50.07 closely followed by Mark Buchanan (Roseville), John Baxter (Lithgow) and Mark Bunt (Katoomba). In Target Rifle B Grade Steve King (Fashions Mount) led with 47.04 and Target Rifle C Grade saw Fashions Mount club mate Michael Cubillo head the list with 49.02.

F Standard A Grade was the most popular discipline as Daniel Galea (Dubbo-Narrromine) and Brett Bond (Lithgow) went to the front with 60.6 and 60.5 possibles ahead of their 12 rivals. F Standard B Grade was a narrow win for local Colin Howell. It seemed that the locals were well experienced with the conditions as Jeff Eppleston took out F Open but these conditions do not regularly occur on the Bathurst Range.

The mirage was starting to play with shooters as the first 600 yard range got underway. Possibles disappeared from all scorecards and some not so hot numbers appeared on others. Magpie threes started to appear on target rifle screens and inner four's became quite common with F Class competitors.

Mark Thurtell (Lyndhurst) topped a group of three in Target Rifle A Grade with 49.06 from Williams and Baxter on 49.04. Target Rifle B Grade fared somewhat worse with Adam Beale (Shore Rifle Club), King (FM) and Sean Willis (Gemfields) all dropping four points, with just centres separating them.

Galea perhaps more experienced in these type of conditions being from the wide open western plains, set up a comfortable lead in F Standard A Grade as the competition hotted up in F Standard B Grade with Lindsay Hough taking out the first 600 yard range. Andrew Beavis (North Sydney Rifle Club) pipped Jeff Eppleston for F Open honours.

With the mirage at its height and the wisp of a breeze starting to ruffle the flags the defining stage saw a couple of the leaders rolled. The flags were of little help as the mirage rarely agreed with the flags which were themselves in total disagreement.

Buchanan grabbed the lead with a range topping 49.07 which allowed him to take out the Target Rifle A Grade match aggregate by two centre bullseyes from Williams.

Beale, an up and coming junior, won two of the three ranges and secured the Target Rifle B Grade title. Crimston despite not winning a range, was the most consistent and took out Target Rifle C Grade by one point.

Despite John Simons (Broken Hill) 60.4 and Ken Eppleston (West Wallsend) 60.3 shooting possibles on the final range, Galea held on for a comfortable four point aggregate win.

Howell snatched the F Standard B Grade Aggregate from Hough with a one point win at the last range. Jeff Eppleston who has been jumping around in recent months from F Standard to FTR to F Open took out the F Open Aggregate by the wide margin of seven points.

David Waters (Katoomba) who supplied the bank of six Silver Mountain Targets and Alan Riley from Katoomba Rifle Club assisted the Bathurst Rifle Club members to conduct a successful meeting. The Willis brothers Grahame and Geoff performed the IT functions admirably.

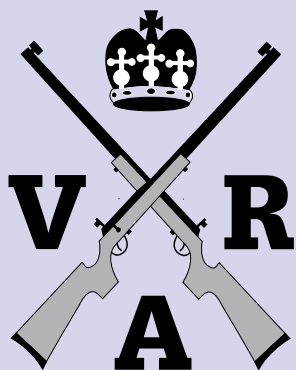

Reg Asquith

1927 - 2018

When it came to shooting Reg Asquith often played second fiddle to his wife, Joyce. But behind the scenes he was a tireless worker for his sport.

Reg died only weeks before his 92nd birthday on October 10 after a long illness.

His funeral was attended by a big crowd of relatives and friends, and shooters from across Victoria and NSW.

Reg was a life member of the Wangaratta Smallbore Rifle Club and was one of the group of stalwarts who helped physically construct the club and range, spending countless hours providing the club a strong foundation.

He joined the Wangaratta Rifle Club in 1945 and was a more than accomplished marksman.

In Joyce's words "he was a good shot but I could beat him".

After losing a lung to cancer in the 1990s, Reg made the move to F Class, shooting from a table until forced to give up shooting in recent years.

For years Reg provided the spotters for the club's shoots and was often heard to complain when they were blown to pieces by the many good shots at Glenrowan.

He loaded ammunition for Joyce and cleaned her rifle. If Joyce thought he had not done things 100 per cent he soon found out.

There are many young shooters who have benefitted from ammunition loaded by Reg, often at no cost.

And whenever the club welcomed visitors to the range it was Reg's ammunition they used to try out our sport.

Reg's life was something many people today could only imagine. In his early days he lived with his family in a small home with a dirt floor. He was a remarkable hunter and gatherer, and was never happier that when fishing and hunting.

Those at the funeral were amazed at the pictures from his early days of



fish caught in local rivers; hundreds of rabbits, ducks and foxes; shot for food and much-needed income.

Reg was joined by Joyce, his wife of 61 years at many of his hunting expeditions, where she and her "best mate" were a formidable partnership.

Reg had two stints working at Bruck Textiles in Wangaratta where he was regarded as a very talented worker. He also tried his hand at gold prospecting with excellent results.

Reg's death leaves a big hole in fullbore and smallbore ranks. We are all the poorer for his passing.

All written material should be sent as plain text. No tables, headings or spreadsheets are needed – just a basic word document or email is best. All headings, tables and formatting are added in later as part of the typesetting process. Text in Times New Roman font at 12 point is preferred.

Photographs should be sent as a .jpg or .tiff format and can be submitted either as a separate attachment to an email or on CD mailed directly to the ATR Post Office Box. Please provide captions for all photographs – either as the filename of the photograph or listed in the report. Do not embed photographs into documents as this renders the photograph unusable for publication.

Prize Meetings

Reports of any shooting events should include details of where and when the event was held, the conditions and competitors on the day and a summary of key scores such as aggregates. Additional material regarding the equipment used by the winners and photographs of the event are also welcome.

Queens Prizes

Reports of Queens Prizes should include information about the conditions and competitors, the lead-up,

Queens, teams and other associated events. Scores should be provided for all badge winners and included in the report as text. (i.e. Not in table or spreadsheet form).

Good photographs allow us to feature an event. Cameras should be set at as high a resolution as possible. It is often advisable to have more than one photographer and to include a variety of photographs by email or CD including shots of: the range, the competitors, the winners and trophies. Presentation photographs can also be included, but often the presentation area has poor lighting and doesn't allow adequate time to set up good photographs for publication purposes, so additional photographs of the event can be important.

Cover photographs

Photographs suitable for a cover should be provided at very high resolution. (300 dpi and 2Mb or above). When taking cover photographs, consider the framing of the photograph with the subject in the foreground and allowing some background (sky or range) for the positioning of the ATR banner.

Deadlines

Think ahead. Good publishing is all about planning. If you are advertising an event, it can be helpful to prepare and submit advertising material up to four months ahead. This allows time for the editing and publication process and assists readers to plan their attendance at your event. Deadlines for the next two issues of ATR are published in the front of each magazine.
